The Hollyburn Chairlift

The Hollyburn area consisted of a group of homes up on Vancouver's Black Mountain, where the modern-day Cypress Mountain ski resort is located. In the 1950s however, there was a group of cabins, clustered on the high reaches of the mountain. These cabins were only accessible by a few logging roads that could often be treacherous to drive on. So, in 1951, the homeowners purchased a Riblet single chairlift, the second chairlift in the Vancouver area (the first one was on Grouse Mountain, built in the 1940s). Alongside the top terminal of the lift, a brand-new ski lodge was constructed, dubbed "Hi-View Lodge". The lift would whisk homeowners on a 12-minute ride up the mountainside, where they could easily access their cabins for the weekend, without having to navigate the treacherous roads.

The chairlift and the lodge were a success and drew many people to ride the chairlift up the mountain, have lunch at the lodge, and ride down. However, on December 26, 1962, an incident happened to the chairlift, which sealed its final fate. The main cable slipped the bottom bull wheel, and the entire lift was de-tensioned. While there were no injuries, many people were stuck on the chairlift for hours in freezing temperatures. And then, on June 6, 1965, the "Hi-View Lodge" mysteriously caught on fire, completely burning down, and seriously damaging the top terminal of the chairlift. While the lift might have been salvageable, it would never operate again.



The following year, new roads were installed, making it easy for people just to simply drive up the mountain to access their cabins. The remains of the lift were taken down soon after. In 2012, the lodge was rebuilt on the old site of the original lodge and operates to this day. While the Hollyburn chairlift and ski slope is long gone, Cypress Mountain, just up the road, is a thriving ski area with multiple chairlifts, and ski runs. So, thus continues on the legacy of the Hollyburn chairlift.

Chocolate Zucchini Cake Recipe

Here is a recipe for Chocolate
Zucchini Cake which my Oma used
to make and my mom does now.
The name of the cake sounds weird
considering it has Zucchini in it.
However, the vegetable is practically
tasteless when you add it all in, what
it does is keeps the cake very moist
and spongey. The overall chocolate
flavor is not affected.

Ingredients

½ cup of soft margarine (or butter)½ cup of vegetable oil1 ¾ cups of sugar

2 eggs

1 tsp of vanilla

½ cup of sour milk (adding vinegar or lemon juice sours the milk)

2 ½ cups of flour

4 Tbsp of cocoa

1 tsp of baking soda

½ tsp of baking powder

½ tsp of cinnamon

½ tsp of cloves

2 cups of zucchini (grated)

1/4 cup of chocolate chips

Topping: ½ cup of brown sugar, ½ cup of chocolate chips



Directions

Sift flour, cocoa, baking soda, baking powder, cinnamon, and cloves together and set aside. Cream margarine(butter), sugar and add eggs one at a time. Add vanilla. Slowly add oil and continue beating. Remove from beater with wooden spoon. Alternately fold flour mixture and sour milk into creamed mixture, starting and finishing with flour mixture. Fold in zucchini and chocolate chips. Spread into well-greased 9x13in pan and sprinkle the top with brown sugar and chocolate chips. Bake at 350F for 40 minutes.

Turner Valley is a small town close to Calgary with a population of 2,559 people. It is most commonly known for being one of the first paces in Alberta to have an oil boom. In 1914 on the banks of the Sheep River in Turner Valley Alberta. Two wells ushered in the first of Alberta's major oil booms, which saw the drilling of hundreds of wells and the establishment of a number of communities in the Turner Valley region.

At its peak during the Second World War, Turner Valley produced more than 95 per cent of Canada's oil and was the most productive oilfield in the British Empire.
