Ski Resort Review: Nakiska

There's no doubt about it, skiing is a daunting sport. Especially for first-time skiers, who have never, or seldom tried the sport. Say you've decided to try the sport. Where do you go? It may be tempting to ask Google, but why do that when I'm going to tell you all the pros and cons of the four ski resorts close to Calgary: Nakiska, Norquay, Sunshine and Lake Louise. I will be using these criteria here:

- 1. Layout of the runs/lifts
- 2. Lodge/rental shop
- 3. Snow conditions/season
- 4. Proximity to Calgary
- 5. Lift Ticket Cost/Season Pass

Let's get started with Nakiska.

NAKISKA

Marketed as "Calgary's Closest Mountain", Nakiska really doesn't fall short on that promise. With over 1,000 skiable acres, it's one of Alberta's most popular resort destinations, for good reason.

1. Layout of the runs/lifts

Nakiska has a very logical lift system. All runs (excluding those off the bronze chair) lead down to the lodge. This means that if you need to get to the lodge, you aren't hindered by a long lift line-up. With three high-speed detachable chairlifts, the lift system at Nakiska is very efficient. The only problem I have, is that the bronze chair, (the beginner chair) is old, slow, and often forms large line-ups. However, if you're willing to move past the bronze chair, the rest is perfect. Experts runs can be found on the Gold Chair, intermediate runs on the Silver and Olympic chairs, and easy runs on the Silver and Bronze chairs. Nakiska has a wide selection of terrain.

I give Nakiska 1.5 out of 2, the lost points being due to the Bronze Chair and the line-ups it gets.

2. Lodge/Rental shop

Nakiska's lodge is old, cramped, and often hard to find a table to eat at. While ski hill food is often pricy, Nakiska is an exception, as often a burger and fries will set you back around \$15 (for somewhat mediocre food, I think). The interior of the lodge is dark, and it's crowded with tables (most of which are full on weekends). The washrooms are actually fairly decent though.

The rental shop isn't that much better, if it's a busy day, expect to be waiting for awhile. However, it's not the end of the world, just sometimes annoying when you want to get on the hill.

I give this category a 1 out of 2, because while the lodge leaves some to be desired, the bathrooms are good, and the rental shop is okay.

3. Snow Conditions/Season

With the wonders of modern technology, Nakiska is able to often open very early in the season. While some years the resort will open in November, other years, the resort has made it to an October start (which is quite impressive). The ski hill generally closes mid-April. While Nakiska doesn't get dumped with snow, it's generally pretty decent snow. The only times you have to watch out is skiing at the very end of the season, but that's to be expected.

4. Proximity to Calgary

From the Calgary city centre, it's around an hour drive to Nakiska, which is very doable for a day trip (keep in mind that it will be less time if you live in the west side of Calgary). The Trans Canada Highway conveniently takes you off until the turnoff to Nakiska.

There is also conveniently a Tim Hortons on that turnoff, so if you get hungry when driving to or from the ski hill, you'll be covered.

5. Lift Ticket Cost/ Ski Pass Price

Ski lift tickets are expensive anywhere you go. Unless it's a day trip for a big mountain resort, I would highly recommend purchasing a season pass. For an adult, a day ticket at Nakiska is around \$78, which, while expensive, is somewhat reasonable. A season pass for a family of five is somewhere in the proximity of \$700 - 1,000. (The 2021-22 pass prices have not yet been announced).

Overall Rating 8/12, or 4/6

Nakiska is a good ski hill. Obviously, not everything's perfect, but no place is going to be perfect. I would highly recommend trying Nakiska, even if you've never been there before.

Raspberry Yogurt Muffins!

Ingredients

¾ cup vegetable oil

1 cup brown sugar

3 eggs

2 cups yogurt

2 ½ cups oats

3 cups all-purpose flour

1 Tsp baking soda

¾ Tsp baking powder

1/4 tsp salt

2 cups frozen raspberries (or cranberries)

Directions

Mix oil and sugar well add eggs individually and beat until light.

Mix in the yogurt.

Combine the dry ingredients with frozen berries.

Mix dry and wet ingredients lightly. Do NOT overmix!

Fill greased muffin cups and bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes.

Makes 18 muffins.
