The inner feelings and experiences make me feel estranged in what is supposed to be my home country.

God used that move in another way. After spending a semester in Canada and discovering community there, we began our journey back to China, stopping en route in Thailand for a company function. While we were there, China's border closed. After waiting in Southeast Asia for a bit over a month, borders worldwide started closing, and we were advised to return to Canada.

Cheesy as it may sound, that trip back to Canada and the subsequent quarantine was like living through a dream. Never have I experienced something so surreal. Part of me was just laughing at the irony of it all, while another part of me was disappointed to be back in Central Alberta. However, I see now that the difficult move of the year before had prepared me for this and given me a cushioned landing thanks to the community, I had already been able to establish.

On July 7, it will have been two years since I was last in China. I don't know when or if I'll be returning. Yet I know that God will continue to be faithful, just as He has been over the past two years and since before time began.

Let's loop back to Hebrews, where we read at the end of the book, "For here we do not have a lasting city, but we are seeking the city which is to come." (Hebrews 13:14)

Both this and the first passage are placed after talking about reproach, trials, and persecution. The first passage is talking about the Hall of Faith inductees, who endured horrendous tribulations (Hebrews 11:35-38). The second one is referring to our willingness to follow Jesus and endure his reproach (Hebrews 13:11-13).

Therefore, don't attempt to meet the status quo. Go out and meet Jesus, knowing that whatever we leave behind, we are going to something, somewhere, and someone so much better.



Is there anything you would like to see added to the Chronicle?


A biblical section that focuses on teaching lessons.

Anne of Green Gables



POSITION OF PARKING PAWL WHEN SHIFTER IS IN PARK.

In this position, the pawl is locked into one of the notches in the metal ring that is attached to the output shaft, which prohibits the shaft and drive wheels from turning.



POSITION OF PAWL WHEN SHIFTER NOT IN PARK

In this position, the pawl is not engaged with the metal ring that is attached to the output shaft so the shaft and drive wheels are free to turn.

My favourite Bible story is the Last Supper, as I cannot help but sympathize with each character in this situation.

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
