Walk in the Light

On February 16th, I returned from Bogota, Colombia. The Ladies Dean from Prairie Christian Academy and I, took eleven high school students on a mission trip there. Our student's main role was to be English teachers to kids in schools in the poorer part of Bogota. It is a big stretch for most of our kids to take on a class of 35 grade four kids, but they rose to the occasion and did great work. We don't get to spend much time with each of these Colombian classes but their teachers tell us that the interest that we show in them really inspires their students to try harder in their English studies.

We also get to work with a couple of orphanages, a home for teenage moms and their babies, two day programs for street kids and a missionary couple who are amazing servants of God. They run one of the street kid's ministries and actually adopt kids into their family (up to twelve kids at a time). Steve and Evie Bartel know what it is to trust in the Lord and their example goes a long way to teaching our students, and us leaders, how to do the same. Our students are deeply impacted by two things in Colombia: the depth of poverty in which some people live and the joy that infuses the lives of Believers in that place, regardless of their financial situation. I am more and more convinced that the things which fill our lives here in Alberta are actually hindrances to our knowing the joy of the Lord.

For me Colombia has deeply impacted my life because of a meeting God planned for me on my first visit six years ago. All team members were invited to the home of Colombian families. There were eight people at the home I went to and the only one who spoke English was a grade two girl. I don't have very much in common with grade 2 girls so our conversation ran out quite quickly. It was a long awkward night but I met a lady who was planning to come to Edmonton. I gave her my daughter's phone number, never expecting she would make contact as she didn't speak much English so I wasn't even sure I heard her correctly. Contact she did and we ended up bringing Angie into our family. After three years her husband and two boys came to join her and they continue to be the biggest blessing to us you could imagine – they have the most vibrant faith I have ever seen. Their family in Colombia insisted I visit this trip and eat with them – all thirteen of them – for five hours! It was a wonderful evening this time as several of them were willing to try their English, although I nearly died from all the food they wanted to serve me.


God changes lives when we open our hearts to his Spirit and mission trips can be the can opener we need. RANDY WOOD

Edson A DAY: Poetry & Public Speaking

On February 12, at our Edson NSA Activity day, students experienced some hands on learning with poetry and public speaking. According to one student's feedback, the local published poet, **Darrin Stephen**, who shared with students, was encouraging and inspirational. He showed:

*how rhyming is a way of expressing feelings

*how poetry gives you an opportunity to not worry about grammar, vocabulary or spelling

*how poetry is a way of telling the reader your point of view

*how poetry allows you to express your feelings without saying them aloud

*how poetry is very personal and can be cheerful and funny, too.



*how poetry uses the five senses, in addition to having students do some of their own writing.

Students applied the five senses in describing a tree for some hands-on writing experience. Mr. Stephens encouraged students to take risks in writing poetry and have fun!

confident public speaking was covered. We reviewed choosing topics, different types of talks, researching tips, first impressions, cue card tips, impromptu talks and the 'rule of three' as described below: All speeches need three parts – an introduction, a body and a conclusion. The chart below summarizes the purpose for each part, what to use in developing each part, the time allotment for each part and when to do each part in the development of a speech.
